By partnering with Lodges to fund projects at a community level, and awarding scholarships to enable individuals to pursue their educational aspirations, FFV aims to make an enduring impact.

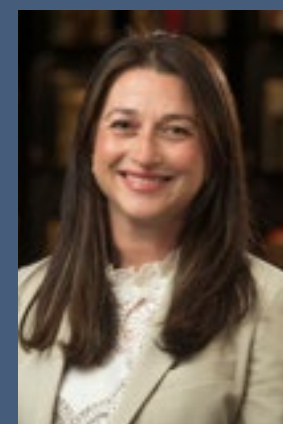

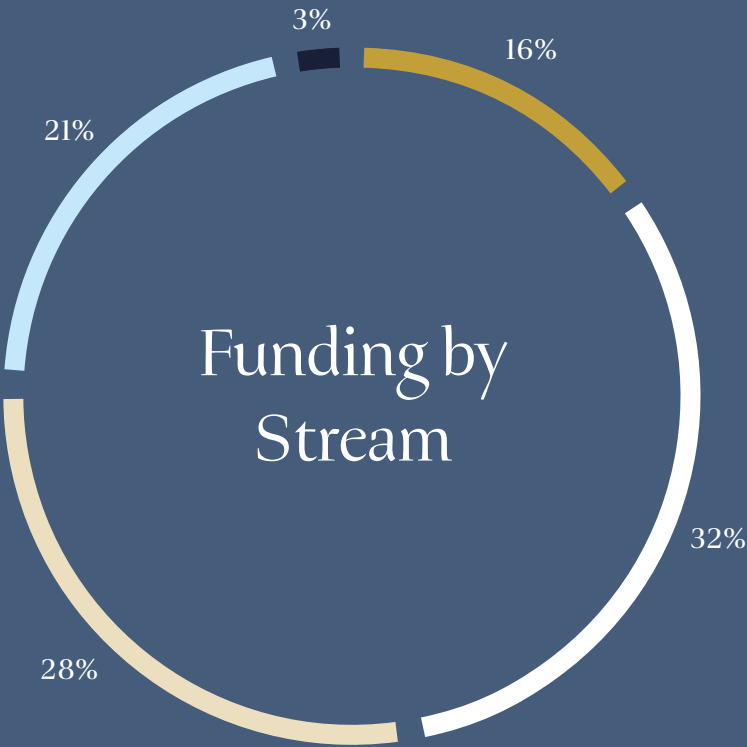

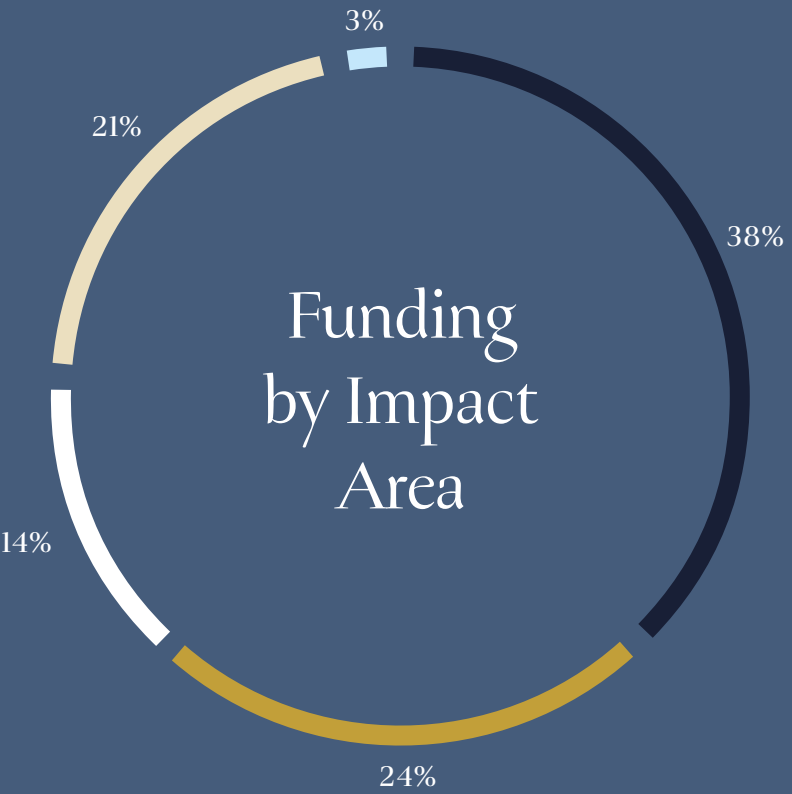

FUNDING

Our Impact Grants enable the Foundation to initiate or support strategic projects that address systemic or emerging issues. These grants are often larger in scale and longer in duration, with the goal of creating long-term change.

The Community Grants program provides an opportunity for registered charities to access support for programs that align with our focus areas.

Guided by our mission and values, this funding empowers not-for-profits to deliver targeted initiatives that respond to community need.

In 2024, our focus areas were broad, including Community Development, Education and Health, Medical Research and Youth Development. These grants are designed to create meaningful change where it's needed most and to amplify the work of organisations already making a difference on the ground.

Eliminating cervical cancer in Victoria

In September 2021, Freemasons Foundation Victoria announced a four-year, \$1 million partnership with Cancer Council Victoria (CCV) to support their goal to eliminate cervical cancer - which is highly preventable through regular cervical screening and the HPV vaccination. The Cervical Cancer Elimination Strategy aims to make Victoria the first place in the world to eliminate cervical cancer as a public health problem by 2035.

Having previously made significant contributions to men's and children's health, FFV saw this as a meaningful opportunity to support women's health.

CCV's strategy was guided by three priorities:

- Increasing cervical screening participation rates;
- Reducing patient level barriers to attending follow-up treatment (such as colposcopy procedures); and
- Increasing community confidence in HPV vaccination, especially in under-vaccinated communities.

Reaching the right audience in Victoria and the wider public health community

Evidence informed approaches

The program began by interviewing 725 Victorian women and a further 67 under-screened women from Arabic, Cantonese and Mandarin speaking communities. Using various research instruments, CCV uncovered the barriers, motivators and knowledge gaps around screening and self-collection, follow-up care and treatment. These insights informed campaigns and strategies – from multimedia campaigns to outreach activities. Over the years, CCV has repeated additional Victorian surveys to guide and monitor the strategy's activities and effectiveness.

In Your Hands campaign

Development and delivery of the statewide In Your Hands campaign highlighted the option of self-collection for cervical screening. A formal evaluation showed increased knowledge and intention to screen among those who recalled the campaign and saw screening test numbers rise across Victoria. Increasing awareness of the HPV vaccination was another focus, especially targeting parents and carers of teens who have missed out on the vaccine due to COVID. These campaigns have encouraged them to check their child's vaccination status and get caught up.

Community champions build trust

CCV also targeted new migrant communities, recognising that young women arriving in Australia may not have been vaccinated in their home country and face increased barriers to cervical screening. To address this, they trained 33 cervical screening champions in the Arabic-speaking community and five in the Punjabi community. Delivery of this information by trusted peers ensures life-saving health information reaches communities in culturally safe and empowering ways.

Additional outreach activities helped reach thousands of people, including through Bush Nursing Centre cervical screening grants. More than 30 resources were developed for priority communities, including culturally safe resources to support Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people. The About Colposcopy video has garnered more than 46,000 views. These resources are now embedded at two major Melbourne colposcopy centres, improving patient experience. This multi-faceted partnership is delivering real impact - increasing awareness, improving access to screening and treatment, and promoting vaccination uptake across diverse communities. It has also been shared on a global stage and helped inform a national agenda to end cervical cancer. By supporting these strategic, evidence-based interventions, FFV is playing a pivotal role in Victoria's journey toward a cervical cancer-free future.





A welcoming table for all

At Christ Church Mission’s Community Centre – affectionately known as St Kilda’s Little Mission – the doors are always open to those seeking connection, nourishment and support.

Each week, around 700 people find a place at the Centre: some come for a meal, others to volunteer, and many simply for the warmth of community.

Thanks to a \$20,000 grant, the Centre has been able to significantly enhance its food program. The funding enabled the purchase of a new commercial freezer and a state-of-the-art Combi Oven – both game changers for the busy kitchen.

“This project has been an outstanding success,” said the Centre team. “The new oven has completely transformed our kitchen operations. It allows us to cook efficiently, reliably and safely, enabling our volunteers to prepare meals on time and serve them hot and fresh. The commercial freezer has greatly expanded our storage capacity, reducing waste and ensuring we always have nutritious ingredients on hand.”

The impact has been immediate and profound. Attendance at food projects has grown by 40%, with guests reporting positive feedback about both the variety and quality of meals. Stronger partnerships have been developed with local bakeries and delicatessens, boosting food rescue and community collaboration. Importantly, the Centre has also strengthened its referral pathways, connecting guests to health, housing and employment services, while encouraging many to give back as volunteers.

The Thursday night Open House dinners are more than a meal – they are a place of belonging, dignity and hope. With this vital support, the Centre is better equipped than ever to serve its diverse community well into the future.

Building tomorrow's leaders in the Southern Grampians

The Southern Grampians region faces a common challenge experienced by many rural communities: young people leave to pursue study and work opportunities, unaware of the wealth of career pathways available locally. The Young Leaders Program, delivered by the Glenelg and Southern Grampians Local Learning and Employment Network (GSGLLEN), is helping to change that story.

Across eight months, 11 students from Year 10 and 11 across four local secondary schools take part in a rich mix of immersive activities designed to build leadership and employability skills. The program not only helps young people gain clarity about their future pathways, but also increases their confidence, communication and teamwork skills, while forging stronger ties to their community.

The 2025 program launched in May at South West TAFE in Hamilton, with students introduced to mentors from a wide range of industries including local government, health, education, law, agriculture and business. The mentors provided guidance and hands-on experience, helping students connect their studies with real-world opportunities.

Throughout the year, the cohort participated in experiences designed to expand horizons. They tested their teamwork in a Masterchef Challenge, guided by the Stephanie Alexander Kitchen Garden Foundation; explored civic leadership with councillors and staff at Southern Grampians Shire Council; and discovered innovation at Sustainable Plastic Solutions.

A visit to Dunkeld Pastoral showcased how tourism, conservation and agriculture intertwine, while a cultural leadership day at the Tyrendarra Indigenous Protected Area gave students the chance to learn directly from Gunditjmara rangers about traditional knowledge, history and the internationally recognised aquaculture systems of Budj Bim.

Each activity brought students closer to understanding the career possibilities in their own backyard. For local businesses, the program offered a chance to showcase industries and highlight employment opportunities, helping to address regional skill shortages. At the same time, mentors benefitted from the fresh perspectives and enthusiasm of the students they supported.

By investing in local youth, the Young Leaders Program strengthens the fabric of the Southern Grampians, cultivating a skilled, confident and community-minded workforce for the future.

Livewire gives teens in crisis a voice and creative outlet

Freemason Foundation Victoria supported Starlight's Livewire program because it fills an important gap for young people and their families – supporting adolescents during times of significant challenge and change.

Livewire is Starlight Children's Foundation's program dedicated to teenagers admitted to the Banksia Mental Health Unit at the Royal Children's Hospital – a 16-bed inpatient unit for young people aged 13 to 17 dealing with an acute mental health condition.

At Banksia, trained Livewire facilitators deliver creative workshops to help young people build confidence, express themselves and connect with peers. Livewire creates opportunities for teens to be teens - to make choices, have a sense of control over their own environment and develop relationships - important aspects of adolescent development that are generally limited in a hospital environment.

The impact of Livewire has been proven over many years. Since its introduction at Banksia in 2012, the program has significantly reduced the need for restrictive interventions such as "code greys" - emergency responses to threatening behaviour - with staff describing Livewire facilitators as an "integral part of our ward program."

FFV funding in 2025 has enabled Starlight's Livewire team to visit the Banksia Ward six days a week and introduce new initiatives that foster both practical skills and emotional wellbeing. In addition to activities such as music, film-making, art, writing, animation and gaming, young people have built confidence and a sense of accomplishment in cooking workshops, and found an outlet for authentic, messy, self-expression in the new "Graffiti Wall".

The workshops provide a positive outlet for expression, helping to keep young people engaged, calm and connected. For many, it has become a safe space for and a powerful way to find relief and release during difficult times.

“Hospital staff see fewer escalations when Livewire is on the ward. Families often share how much lighter and more hopeful their child seems after a session.

In a huge collaborative effort, 17 Lodges from across the Northern District joined forces to support The Good Samaritan Inn in the establishment of their new Banyule accommodation site. This safe and supportive facility will provide housing for 10 women and 20 children and young people, with a focus on promoting independence and healing over a 12-month period.

Together, the Foundation and Lodges contributed \$120,000 to the project. The Foundation 's contribution recognised and amplified the extraordinary collaboration of the 17 Lodges, who united to mark the Ivalda Masonic Centre Centenary with this significant community investment.

The funds are supporting:

Essential whitegoods - equipping each apartment with \$50,000 to equip each apartment with an oven, rangehood, fridge/freezer and dishwasher, giving every family the resources to live independently and rebuild their lives in comfort and security.

Counselling services - delivering individual and group counselling, including 10 x 60-minute sessions for 15 women, and 32 parenting group sessions for 20 women over two years. These programs are critical therapeutic interventions for women recovering from the trauma of family violence.

Permanent children's play equipment - installation of an accessible swing set – providing safe play opportunities that support children's healing, joy and connection with their mothers.

At the Ivalda Masonic Centre Grand Re-Opening on 29 May 2025, the cheque was presented to Good Samaritan Inn CEO Felicity Rourke. This project stands as a testament to the power of collaboration - with the Foundation and Northern District Lodges uniting to create a safe, supportive, and healing environment for women and children escaping family violence.

Ronald McDonald House Charities Victoria & Tasmania (RMHC VIC & TAS) exists to ease the burden of illness by providing a welcoming "home-away-from-home", close to major paediatric hospitals. Families are offered free accommodation, meals, laundry facilities, support services and, just as importantly, opportunities to connect with others facing similar challenges.

With support from FFV and Gregorios Lodge, RMHC introduced a Pet Therapy Program for families staying at its Victorian Houses. Delivered in partnership with the Lort Smith Pet Therapy service, the program offers 24 sessions across nine months, where trained volunteers and their therapy dogs spend time with children and parents.

The benefits of the human-animal bond go far beyond companionship. Research shows that interacting with therapy dogs can reduce stress, lower blood pressure, improve mood and help families feel more resilient and connected. For children missing their own pets or feeling anxious about hospital treatment, these visits provide moments of joy and calm.

Families and staff have spoken about the positive impact, such as the animals' presence giving their child something to look forward to and de-stress with upon returning from treatment at hospital.

With initiatives like Pet Therapy, RMHC VIC & TAS continues to create safe, supportive spaces for families navigating some of their toughest times.

Communication upgrades boost Cohuna CFA Brigade

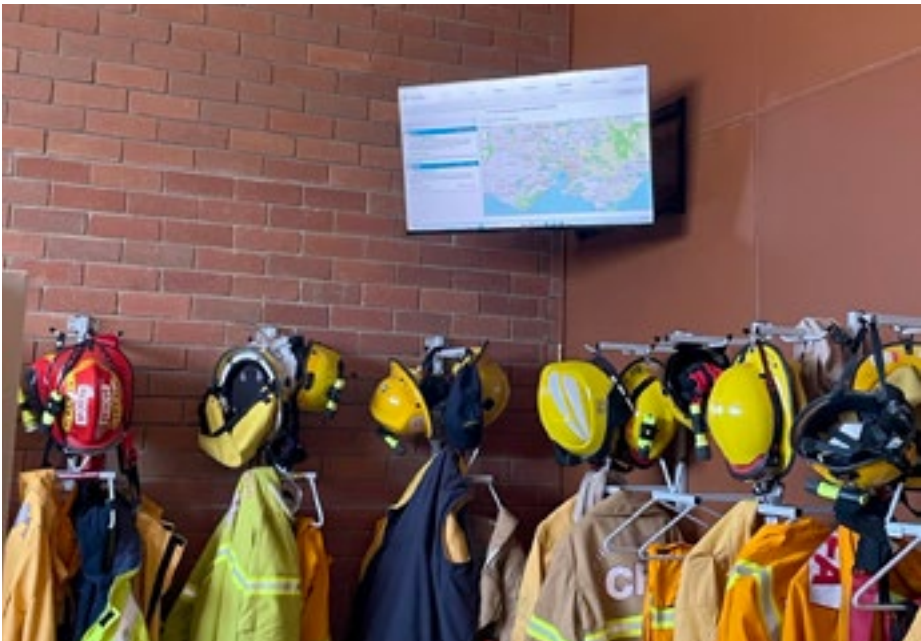
When an emergency strikes, every second counts. Thanks to a grant supported by Cohuna Masonic Lodge and FFV, the Cohuna CFA Brigade will benefit from vital communication upgrades to help keep the community safer.

The grant contributed to the purchase of wiring and associated hardware to support five new television monitors, strategically placed throughout the station as advised by CFA experts.

Each monitor will be connected with data and coax cabling, allowing real-time information to flow directly from CFA paging systems to brigade volunteers. This kind of communications upgrade isn't covered by the Government's Volunteer Emergency Services Equipment Program, which is why community support through local Freemasons is so valuable in making it possible.

For a rescue-accredited brigade that responded to more than 120 emergency events in 2024, this upgrade is a game changer. The live feed will give Cohuna CFA members critical details about each emergency, including firefighter attendance, appliance requests, patient and asset observations, and navigation information.

Importantly, the new system will also strengthen the Brigade's training environment. With CFA volunteers required to continually upskill, the addition of live information points will create more effective opportunities for learning and preparation.

The Cohuna CFA Brigade is made up entirely of volunteers - locals who not only serve in times of emergency but also contribute in countless ways to community life. Their role is particularly vital in this regional area, where the brigade often responds to rescues as far as 60km from town.

This project is a true example of Freemasonry at work in the community. The local Lodges identified an urgent local need and, together with the Foundation, helped make it possible. The result is a safer, stronger Cohuna - and a Brigade better equipped to protect lives.

Scholarships and Tertiary Support



FFV's Scholarships and Bursaries support young people to pursue education and build a brighter future - regardless of their circumstances.

This annual program continues the 113 year legacy of supporting education through a Foundation-run scholarship program. Awards are available for students in Years 7–12, as well as those entering their first year of tertiary education at a Victorian university or TAFE.

FFV also awards Tertiary Support Scholarships of up to \$3,000 to students undertaking their first tertiary course or continuing studies related to their original course at a Victorian university or TAFE. These scholarships are designed to ease financial pressure and remove barriers to success, so students can focus on learning and growth.

In April and May 2025, FFV hosted two Scholarship Presentation Evenings, bringing together more than 270 guests to celebrate the achievements of 114 remarkable students. Families, friends and supporters travelled from across the state to share in the occasion.

The evenings provided more than recognition; they were an opportunity to inspire. Guests heard from FFV Chairman Garry James, Freemasons Victoria Grand Master Peter Henshall, Deputy Grand Master Myles King OAM and FFV CEO Sandra Jacobs. Their words of encouragement and wisdom will stay with students as they embark on the next stage of their journeys.

2024 scholarship recipient Bianca Pollard shared her story at the events too, highlighting the real impact of the program. Catering was provided by the talented team at Common Bean Café from Banksia Gardens Community Services, showcasing another wonderful community partnership.

For FFV, these scholarships are more than simply financial assistance, they are a commitment to fostering talent, perseverance and ambition. More than a century since the first Freemasons scholarship was awarded, this intention remains as strong as ever.

Ethan finds balance and focus thanks to scholarship

“Knowing I have three years of support behind me has boosted my confidence. It’s reassuring to know I can manage uni, work, and life without my savings dwindling away.”



At just 15, Ethan Jesse began his first casual job at McDonald’s, quickly taking on a leadership role as a Crew Coach. His early experience sparked a passion for the food industry, motivated by his father’s challenges as a coeliac, and inspired his goal to make gluten-free products more accessible and affordable. Through determination, he balanced work, school, and leadership roles. He mentored younger students in maths, served as a Mentor Leader at Blackburn High School, and helped coordinate fundraisers for the Fred Hollows Foundation. Even after a serious concussion during Year 12 football, he stayed focused on recovery and study, achieving an ATAR above his goal. Alongside his school commitments, he worked in multiple casual roles, including Woolworths and ProQuest, demonstrating a strong work ethic.

Now studying a Bachelor of Commerce and Arts at Monash University, Ethan is exploring future pathways, from owning a business to working in global commerce. While adjusting to the greater study load has been challenging, he is proud of his first-semester results and is continuing to find his balance between study, work and home life.

The Freemasons Foundation Victoria scholarship has helped him manage additional costs like fuel and transport and allowed him to focus on his degree and long-term ambition of improving food options for people with dietary needs.

Rachel Barry’s path to university has been shaped by extraordinary resilience. After losing her father, a Freemason, to cancer in 2020 and supporting both him and her brother through serious illness, Rachel faced immense challenges during her schooling. Despite the circumstances, she excelled academically - earning Academic Excellence awards in Chemistry and English, and placing in the top 5% of the state for Chemistry.

Rachel’s early exposure to MRIs through family illness sparked a fascination, and with a strong track record of excelling in STEM subjects, she is now thriving in her first year of a Bachelor of Medical Radiations (Medical Imaging) at RMIT Bundoora. She achieved high distinctions across all subjects in her first semester, including a perfect score on a physics test, and found clinical placement a highlight that reinforced her passion for patient care and imaging technology.

The Freemasons Foundation Victoria Tertiary Scholarship has eased financial pressures and stress, enabling Rachel to focus on her studies, engage in university life and plan for the future, including pursuing sonography after her degree.

The 1889 Bequest Society



The 1889 Bequest Society was established to thank and acknowledge people in their lifetime for making a bequest to Freemasons Foundation Victoria.

It is named for the year in which FFV found its beginnings. In 1889, a donation of 500 pounds was received from Grand Master, Most Worshipful Brother Sir William Clarke, 1st Baronet. It was a substantial amount – equivalent in today's terms to more than 10 years wages for an ordinary worker, and this generous gift is still giving.

A bequest may take the form of the whole or any portion of an estate or a specific sum of money. Choosing to leave a gift of even 1% of an estate will help FFV continue its work into the future. Anyone who notifies FFV that they have included a gift in their Will to FFV is invited to join the 1889 Bequest Society.

Each year, we hold the 1889 Bequest Society lunch to thank and recognise those who have pledged a lasting gift. The event also offers attendees the chance to hear directly from a grant recipient whose project is making a real difference in the community.

This year's guest speaker was filmmaker Leila McDougal, who shared the story behind Just A Farmer - a powerful film addressing mental health and suicide in rural and regional communities. Leila spoke movingly about the film's impact and the vital role of FFV's support, leaving guests inspired by the life-changing potential of their bequests.

FFV would like to sincerely thank those men and women that have already made a bequest to FFV as part of their Will. Their legacies will support our work into the future.
